
- Book discussions by authors Jack Gobbell (A Call of Color) and Michael Keith Olson (Tales from a Tin Can)

SECRETARY SHULTZ RECEIVES DEWEY AWARD

A distinguished delegation from the Naval Order visited the home of the Hon. George P. Shultz on 25 September to present the 2007 Admiral of the Navy George Dewey Award. The award recognizes the exemplary service of a senior civilian whose record of service sets him apart from his peers. Beginning with its inception in 2002, past Dewey Award recipients are President George H. W. Bush, Dr. Robert D. Ballard, RADM Jeremiah A. Denton, Jr., and the Hon. Gordon R. England. Each honoree receives a plaque and Life Membership in the Naval Order of the United States.

Sec. Shultz's long career in public service included terms as the Secretary of Labor, the Secretary of the Treasury and the Secretary of State. He served as an officer in the U. S. Marine Corps during World War II.

NORMANDY MONUMENT DEDICATION

Looks like a GO for September 2008!

Had enough of humdrum vacations? Can we tempt you with a trip to enjoy the beauty, wines, and cuisine of an historic part of France—an area in Europe where Americans are revered! More important, this opportunity connects *you* with a monumental event in international history, and pays homage to 1068 American sailors who died while sealing the Allied victory in the Invasion of Normandy. If all this interests you, read on...

Companions at the 2007 National Congress learned the Naval Order has received funds and rock-solid pledges amounting to 80% of our \$500,000 goal for the Normandy Monument Project. We began our national campaign to erect a monument on UTAH Beach in December 2006, after confirming that the US Navy is the only American or Allied service without proper tribute to its part in the Invasion at Normandy.

Military historians estimate about 5300 American and Allied servicemen died in the first two days of fighting. About one of every four Americans who died in the earliest days of the Invasion was a US Navy sailor. These heroes remain unrecognized at the beaches there today. A plaque there does commemorate the sacrifice and valor of US Coast Guardsmen killed at Normandy.

Planning the Dedication. Based on funds already collected, quality of pledges received, and momentum generated, the Naval Order's General Council approved the following:

 Plan for the formal Monument Dedication at UTAH Beach on Saturday, 27 September 2008. CAPT Greg Streeter

of First Coast Commandery, NOUS Commander General-Elect and Monument Project Chairman, proposed the date for two reasons: to take advantage of off-season travel fares, and to make the Dedication as soon as possible. It's a sad fact that World War II vets are now of an age when we lose about 1000 every day.

- Initiate liaison with the government of France, American Battle Monuments Commission, and U.S. Depts. of State and Defense, the U.S. Navy and Navy Band for the Dedication ceremonies.
- Put together a 5-day, all-expense-paid tour (less transatlantic airfare) of Normandy and the Monument Dedication by Historic Tours, Inc. The owners, Companion Ray Pfeiffer and his wife Cristy, live in Normandy and have conducted battlefield tours there for 25 years. They estimate such a tour will cost about \$2,950 per person, to include a \$250 donation from each confirmed reservation toward the balance still due for the Monument. (Sounds expensive? The devalued U.S. dollar is another sad fact.)
- Confirm tour costs and schedule in early 2008 to give Companions time to make travel and vacation plans. Deposits for the proposed Monument Dedication tour will probably be due in March 2008. Our website, www.normandymonument.org, will post up-to-date details.

You Can Help. CAPT Ken Johnson, Naval Order Commander General, emphasizes that Companions who may not be able to attend the Dedication in person can still help the Monument campaign: "The major way you can help does NOT involve a donation! Rather, if you know of a Navy veteran of Normandy, please tell him about the Dedication and then pass that vet's

contact information to us so we can get an invitation to that sailor." Pass any such contact details directly to Greg Streeter at 904-221-0923 or **gstreetr@bellsouth.net** or to Dan Felger at 202-488-8268 or **danjeandc@verizon.net**.

At the Monterey Congress CAPT Johnson reminded NOUS Companions that the veterans' service at Normandy mandates that each should receive an invitation. He also asked that individual Companions ask for help from their local chapters of the Navy League, MOAA, American Legion and VFW to identify those vets.

Meanwhile, we remind each Commandery and every Companion that the Monument Project still needs to raise another \$100,000. The donations of Companions are tax-deductible under IRS Code Section 501(c)(19). Please specify the "Normandy Monument" on your check and send to CAPT Michelle Lockwood, 2222 Alameda de las Pulgas, San Mateo CA 94403-1216.

Other benefactors who are not Companions will receive similar deductions under IRS Code 501(c)(3) by contributing to the non-profit Naval Order of the United States Foundation. These checks should be sent to Naval Order Foundation, PO Box 583, Glenview, IL 60025-0583.

BM2 PERRETT STILL EARNS KUDOS

Our late Companion Marvin J. Perrett was named a winner of the 2006 Spirit of Hope Award, presented to individuals who epitomize honor, integrity and selfless dedication.



Marvin began his service to his country in World War II. He served as a Coxswain of the Higgins landing craft during the D-Day invasion at Normandy, the invasion of Iwo Jima, and the invasion of Okinawa. During his lifetime Marvin educated thousands of people on the Coast Guard and World War II. He played an integral part in establishing the National World War II Museum in New Orleans and was featured in documentaries and news programs about the war. Marvin fully exemplified the values and character of Bob Hope, with his unrelenting desire to entertain and tell the story of the brave work of men and women in the military.

Marvin's daughter, Melissa Cook, accepted the Spirit of Hope medal on her father's behalf at a ceremony in the Pentagon on 19 November. Mrs. Cook called the award "a beautiful tribute my father's optimism, zest for life, and longstanding mission to travel the world as an informal Coast Guard ambassador."

On 20 OCT 2007, CAPT Kenneth A. Johnson, USN (Ret) relieved CAPT Carter Conlin, USN (Ret) as the Naval Order's 36th Commander General. Carter passed the "official gavel" to Ken after presenting the Distinguished Sea Service Award to ADM Thomas B. Fargo, USN (Ret).



CAPT Johnson retired from the Navy with 31 years of service in various surface combatants, key staff positions in the Pacific Theater, and as Aide to the Chief of Naval Operations. He commanded both USS BAGLEY (FF 1069) and the U.S. Naval Communication Station at Stockton, CA. He also served a tour in Vietnam as a Naval Advisor to the Vietnamese Navy.

After retiring, he held the position of Manager for Navy and DOD Government Relations, GTE Government Systems Corporation, Washington, DC. Later returning to the Monterey Peninsula, CPT Johnson served as Director of Alumni Relations, Naval Postgraduate School. He is a graduate of the University of Southern California, Armed Forces Staff College, National War College, and the Naval Postgraduate School with an MS in Communications.

CAPT Johnson is a life member of the Naval Order, Surface Naval Association, Navy League, and serves on the Board of Directors of the Monterey History and Arts Association. His many leadership positions within the Naval Order include those of Historian, National Capitol Commandery; Vice Commander General for Membership (four years); Commander of the Monterey Bay Commandery; President of the Naval Order Foundation; and as the Commander General – Elect. He and his wife Judy (also a Life Member) reside in Pacific Grove.

CAPT Johnson's personal decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit with Gold Star in lieu of Second Award, Meritorious Service Medal, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" and Gold Star in lieu Second Award.

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COMPANION RECEIVES CROAT STATE DECORATION

CAPT Bob Lunney, USN (Ret) of the New York Commandery received the Order of the Trefoil on 26 SEP 2007, in a ceremony at the Croatian Permanent Mission to the United Nations. President Mesic made the presentation to recognize CAPT Lunney's work in finding the family of Peter Tomich, a Croatian immigrant killed at Pearl Harbor, for the delivery of Tomich's posthumous Medal of Honor.

At the ceremony, CAPT Lunney—who

also holds the rank of RADM in the New York Naval Militia—talked about his search and described the leadership and sacrifice of Chief Water Tender Tomich. "His shipmates remembered his quiet demeanor and concern for his men. Survivors told how the UTAH capsized within 12 minutes of the attack, with the Japanese machine-gunning the crew as they abandoned ship. One shipmate told me about escaping the engine spaces while the Chief headed down the ladder to secure the boilers and ensure his men were all out safely. His courageous act saved many lives."

The Navy commissioned USS TOMICH (DE 242) in 1942 and established its Senior Enlisted Academy in Tomich Hall on Naval Station Newport, RI in 1981. Significantly, the Academy's motto is "Leadership by Example." Tomich was recognized once again through the efforts of Companion Bob Lunney, when the Medal of Honor was finally presented to Tomich's cousin in May 2006.

REMARKS BY ADMIRAL THOMAS B. FARGO, USN (RET) RECIPIENT OF THE 2007 DISTINGUISHED SEA SERVICE AWARD

Made at the DSSA Gala, NOUS National Congress in Monterey, CA 20 October 2007

Thank you, Carter for the warm introduction. As I reflect back, there are lots of people that have said nice things about me in the past, but all of them worked for me and I wrote their evaluations – so they hardly count. So, thanks to the Naval Order of the United States for this very gracious and generous honor of your prestigious Distinguished Sea Service Award for 2007.

It's a special privilege to be the 18th recipient in the line of maritime flag and general officers, many of whom I have had the pleasure of working with over my 35-years of Naval service and respect greatly. Indeed to follow in the footsteps of recipients such as Ambassador Bill Crowe, General Tony Zinni, Admiral Archie Clemins, and last year's recipient, Admiral Vern Clark, is by itself a very special honor. I know each of them well, their contrasting styles, and once again have tremendous respect for their leadership.

Admiral and later Ambassador Bill Crowe, along with one of his running mates, Admiral Bob Long raised Vern Clark and me as lieutenants, young pups they might say, in the Pentagon in the mid 1970s.

Of course we lost Bill Crowe early this week at the age of 82, which saddens all of us who had the great fortune of knowing him. He had a fabulous intellect, a Ph.D. from Princeton, and a legendary sense of humor. Many of us made our decision to stay in the Navy based on our contact with leaders like Bill Crowe and Bob Long, and as we climbed the ranks, they were always there to provide advice and counsel along the way.

Tony Zinni was my boss during my two years in the Persian Gulf commanding the FIFTHFLT. One of the best pure leaders I have known ... great instincts, exceptional political, diplomatic, and operational skills and fearless in his obligation to provide his best military advice to our civilian leadership.

Archie Clemins was my Task Force Commander when I deployed to the Western Pacific as Commanding Officer of SALT LAKE CITY. One of the best and most aggressive operators I have seen. Every Commanding Officer has their tough days or maybe weeks. During one of those periods when it seemed everything that could break did break and we had a sensitive operation coming up, I



sent him a message asking for help. I got a short note back and the kind of immediate support that facilitated our success at sea.

So add them to folks like Admirals Hank Mauz who is with us here tonight, Paul Miller and Jay Johnson, clearly I have been fortunate to work with and learn from the very best.

Looking back on my career, I really have been blessed.

There were moments throughout those early years when I thought making Lieutenant might be a bit of a stretch. I remember one day in particular trying to explain to my Commanding Officer why I had attempted to pump the entire Atlantic Ocean into the forward trim tank of our submarine. Of course it didn't fit and we started to sink.

Years later while in Command of the Pacific Fleet, sitting in the same office where Admiral Nimitz and his staff made the most difficult decisions of the war, it was apparent to me that I was only there because of a set of visionary and compassionate leaders, who over the years felt I might learn something from these transgressions that would serve the Navy well.

I really don't plan to say much more about my 35 years other than the guy who coined the phrase; "Join the Navy and see the world" didn't realize how prophetic he really would be.

In those 35 years, I have:

- Climbed Mount Fuji
- Walked the Great Wall of China
- Scaled Machu Picchu in Peru
- Taken Sarah and Bill to the Pyramids and the Valley of Kings and Queens in Egypt
- And walked the beaches of Ipanema and Copacabana...Sarah, that was before we were married.
- So this Maritime life is a calling and a life adventure I would recommend readily.

Before I get too far along, let me thank you all for being here. And while I can't acknowledge everyone, there are a few family and friends I would like to introduce.

- My wife Sarah...we just celebrated our 25th anniversary. I reported to USS Plunger exactly one week after getting married. We drove to Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremer-ton, Washington. Sarah's first introduction as a Navy wife was checking into our new residence, the Bachelor Officer Quarters.
- My brother Captain Keith Fargo and sister Bobbie, who is an accomplished attorney, are here. We are a Navy family. My grandfather, Darwin Tuttle, was a Naval Aviator #1599. My father was also a Naval Aviator, my stepfather a Surface Warfare Officer and my mother a Navy Nurse. My mother's great uncle was Fleet Admiral William Leahy. So as you can see, my youngest son is under some pressure.
- Sitting with them is the Tuttle and Noak families - who once actually traveled all the way to Bahrain to see us for a Change of Command.
- My first good friend in the Navy, Gordon Eubanks and his wife Ronda.
- And number of sets of friends, Dick and Bonnie Cook, Dan and Kelly Decker and Ambassador David Lyon who I served with in the Pacific.
- Along with Hank and Peggy Mauz and friends from the Naval Postgraduate school and its Foundation.
- Rear Admiral Mark Emerson, our Senior Active Flag Officer here tonight who commands the Naval Strike Warfare Center.
- And my colleague from my current business life at Trex and Loea, Dr. Eric Korevaar.

Thank you all for coming and of course my special thanks to the entire Naval Order.

As companions of the Naval Order, you have served or are serving now in one of our Nation's Sea Services. Many of you have been in the vanguard with our forward deployed forces or performed with distinction in assignments to ensure the battle readiness of those deployed forces. We applaud your efforts and the sacrifices your families have made to support you in your calling to our Nation during times of crisis.

Today our Nation faces an enemy and threat significantly different from those encountered by the free world and democracy in World War II and the decades following. America and our Allies prevailed in World War II and – ultimately – in the Cold War through our strength of character, the quality of our people and a keen understanding of the singular power of freedom and tolerance...generations of men and women who were willing to fight for their country. On the waters of the Pacific, in the air and under the sea, they signed up and moved out—they surrendered their lives and committed their futures to a cause greater than any individual.

And while there are differences today in the age of an all-volunteer force and a threat that is difficult to understand and even harder to focus the attention of an entire nation, make no mistake about the quality and commitment of our people. Spend five minutes with any young Sailor or Marine returning from Iraq or Afghanistan and you will recognize the same sense of dedication, a measure of courage that will rival any generation and an unshakeable belief that they can help their fellow man.

The Naval Order does a fabulous job of paying tribute to each and every generation that has served. Recognition at Pearl Harbor Day, our victory at Midway, USS MAINE Day, and the founding of the United States Navy are just a few of the many events that are observed. Two years ago, you undertook the efforts to build and transport a monument honoring the United States Navy's contributions in the invasion of Normandy on D-Day. Your efforts will finally recognize those 1,068 men who lost their lives that day. From earlier conversations with Carter and your Foundation President, Ken Johnson, I understand that you have raised close to 75 percent of the \$500,000 to make your 2008 dedication date a reality. And of course I'll help with both a donation and some of the experience we have gained rebuilding the Arizona Museum and Visitors Center commemorating those lost some 10,000 miles away, at Pearl Harbor.

I congratulate Carter who sponsored my membership on December 7th, 1999, and his wife Nancy, for their leadership these many past years as the Naval Order took on greater responsibilities.

My personal congratulations to Ken Johnson, a friend since the days many years ago, when we walked the halls of the Pentagon together, and his wife, Judy. It is great to be back in Monterey with you and to receive this award.

There have been wonderful efforts recently to capture the valor of our soldiers. sailors and citizens. Probably the best known is Ken Burns' World War II documentary "Witnesses to the War" on PBS. Another that I would recommend highly to you is Robert Kaplan's new book Hog Pilots, Blue Water Grunts. Robert was a frequent visitor with us at the Pacific Command, but more importantly traveled the world over to talk to our troops. In a review of this book, General Bob Scales tells how Robert describes a young man known as a "screw up" in high school now a Second Class Petty Officer who serves as a Tactical Information Coordinator and is praised by his superiors. Specifically, the Navy made him "the geek that he was always meant to be." Robert shares stories of how military service often provides a catalyst to the "common" young men and women who join and who inevitably perform exceptional deeds. He continues by saving that it is in wartime that this conversion - from screw up to super geek – is most valuable, but that the brave

and extraordinary actions of our young military often go unnoticed or even worse unappreciated.

So my message tonight is that there are literally thousands of sailors and marines — and their fellow brothers in arms — who you could and actually do honor every day. Please keep them in your thoughts and prayers.

God bless each of you and your families...and may God continue to bless America.
