Commander General's Report to the Order

It is now June, and we have only four months or less before we gather in Jacksonville and officially call Congress 2009 in session. Committee meetings start early on Wednesday, 14 October before we formally open the Congress the following morning. Much has happened since our Winter newsletter hit the street. The Phase II contract for the illumination of the Navy D-Day Monument has been signed. This project is scheduled for completion in the next 12 months and does require more financial support. Our Vice Commander General for Membership, Don Schuld, has done another tremendous job in getting both the Atlanta and Raleigh Commanderies back in the fold after identifying new Commanders for each. In February, the General Council and Companions to the General Council approved a donation to the Naval War College Foundation for the digitization of Admiral Nimitz's "Grey Book." This important initiative will preserve the single most important source of information on how the U.S. Navy fought the War in the Pacific. BRAVO ZULU to Doug Smith, Commander of the Newport Commandery, for bringing the plan for Nimitz's "Grey Book" before the Naval Order leadership. CDR Smith will have more details for us at the Jacksonville Congress.

I am pleased to announce that LCDR Michele Poole, a Companion since 1998, has accepted the position of Managing Editor *of NOUS News*. She and CAPT Kate Gray worked for several months towards a seamless transition, with Michele taking editorship with the Summer issue. Tidd, CHC, USN, whose inspirational prayers meant so much at the Monument Dedication in Normandy, has been selected for Flag and a new assignment as Deputy Chief of Navy Chaplains and as the Chaplain of the Marine Corps.

BATTLE OF MANILA BAY COMMEMORATION

Companions of the National Capitol Commandery commemorated the 111th anniversary of the stunning naval victory at Manila Bay with a wreath-laying at the Washington National Cathedral. The ceremony, on 29 April, took place in the Bethlehem Chapel near the crypt of Admiral of the Navy, George Dewey.

Admiral Dewey (26 DEC 1837 - 16 JAN 1917) was yet a Commodore during the Spanish-American War in 1898. He is perhaps best known for his victory at the Battle of Manila Bay. Among his forces, not a single life was lost in combat, though one man died of heat stroke. Dewey was later the only American to attain the rank of Admiral of the Navy, awarded as a result of the significance of his victory. Following the Battle of Manila Bay, the Philippines began its long road to independence and the U.S. became a world power overnight. Admiral Dewey was a founder of the Naval Order of the United States in 1890 and also a strong proponent for building the Washington National Cathedral.

The principal speaker this year was VADM John Harvey, USN, Director Navy Staff. He described Admiral Dewey's key role initially leading the General Board that guided the war plans, shipbuilding and personnel policies of the U.S. Navy from WWI through WWII. Along with a number of Companions and friends, attendees at this year's commemoration included CAPT Antonio Habulan, the Philippine Naval Attaché; CDR Warren Buller, precom unit CO for USS DEWEY (DDG-105) now under construction at Pascagoula; and Mrs. Deborah Mullen, wife of CJCS ADM Mike Mullen (and sponsor for USS DEWEY). Fr. Charles Nalls, Commandery Chaplain, led the Benediction.

YOUNG HISTORIANS WIN NAVAL ORDER AWARDS

National Capitol and Hampton Roads Commanderies joined forces to present two special awards at the Virginia History Day (VHD) competition in April. This statelevel contest for high school and middle school students was sponsored by Colonial Williamsburg Foundation with "The Individual in History: Actions and Legacies" as its theme. Regional winners from all over the Commonwealth gathered with presentations as varied as costumed performances, website displays, documentary films, and the more traditional display boards and papers.

This is the second year the Naval Order has taken part in the event, after CAPT Chuck Chadbourn of the National Capital Commandery launched participation in 2008. NOUS judges viewed some marvelously creative submissions before awarding two prizes of \$200 each for the best presentations relating to maritime history. 8th graders Fae Montgomery and Honora Overby shared a prize for their dramatic interpretation of Queen Elizabeth I, Lord Burghley, and the strategic role of seapower. 7th grader Grace Tamblyn gave a colorful account of Captain Cook's epic voyages with a simple display of charts and facts as backdrop. All three girls also received the Naval Order's Certificates of Award. The VHD winners from every category – and there were many! – will go on to the National History Competition in June at the University of Maryland.



ADM FALLON TO RECEIVE DSSA

The Naval Order recently named ADM William J. Fallon, USN (Ret), as its 2009 *Distinguished Sea Service Award* honoree. ADM Fallon retired in 2008 after a distinguished 40 year career of military and strategic leadership. He has led U.S. and Allied forces in eight separate commands and played a leadership role in military and diplomatic matters at the highest levels of the U.S. government.

As head of U.S. Central Command, ADM Fallon directed all U.S. military operations in the Middle East, Central Asia and Horn of Africa, focusing on combat efforts in Iraq and Afghanistan. He earlier led the U.S. Pacific Command for two years, directing political-military activities in the Asia-Pacific region. His achievements include a resumption of military engagement with China, new outreach to India, a new agreement on a strategic framework with Japan, and humanitarian assistance to the victims of the 2004 Tsunami in SE Asia. He also

served as Presidential Envoy to Japan, handling bi-lateral relations after the collision of a U.S. submarine and a Japanese fishing vessel. Prior assignments included that of Vice Chief of Naval Operations and the U.S. Atlantic Fleet and U.S. Fleet Forces Command, with responsibility for the readiness of U.S. Naval forces worldwide.

Beginning as a combat aviator flying from a carrier during the Vietnam War, he

participated in many vital U.S. military operations. He led a Carrier Air Wing in combat during the Gulf War of 1991, and commanded a Navy Battle Group and the U.S. 6th Fleet Battle Force during NATO military operations in Bosnia.

ADM Fallon is a graduate of Villanova University, the U.S. Naval War College, the National War College, and has an MA in International Studies from Old Dominion University. In addition to his private consulting business, he serves on the Global Affairs Advisory Board of Occidental College as well as several corporate boards. ADM Fallon is currently a Robert E. Wilhelm Fellow at MIT's Center for International Studies.

UPDATE ON OUR NAVY D-DAY MONUMENT AT NORMANDY

The Naval Order signed the Monument's Phase II contract in April, providing for illumination of the Navy D-Day Normandy Monument. Our sculptor, Stephen Spears, has the first payment of \$40,000 so this portion of the project can move from design to construction. This enhancement to the Monument is scheduled to be completed within the year and requires additional financial support.



Five granite pedestals will be installed, each with a lighting assembly embedded in its base. The pedestals will be arranged so the light from each will illuminate one side of the pentagonal-shaped base of the Monument. Symbolically, it will complete the five points of the star, representing the United States, with the Navy D-Day Monument as the star's center. Bronze bas-reliefs and engraving depicting the actions of the various participating Normandy groups could be added to the pedestals later as funds become available from these organizations.

The total cost of Phase II will be \$125,000. Our great benefactor, Marshall Cloyd, whose generous contributions have already done so much, has pledged another \$40,000 toward Phase II. Now, we need *your* support to raise the remaining \$45,000. We ask you once again to "dig a little deeper," to contribute whatever you

2009 HORNER FOUNDATION AWARDS

In 1965, the Illinois Commandery created annual awards for the top Midshipmen Second Class at each of the three Illinois NROTC universities to honor CDR Maurice L. Horner, USNR (Ret). CDR Horner saw service in the Army during WWI, and with the Navy in WWII and the Korean War. He held many leadership roles in the Illinois Commandery and as a NOUS national officer.

This year's *Maurice L. Horner Awards* were presented to Midn 2/C Luke Adams at Northwestern University, Midn 2/C Thomas C. Mulhern at the University of Illinois, and Sgt Brandy L. Holtz at the Illinois Institute of Technology. Each winner received a \$750 scholarship grant and a three-year membership in the Naval Institute.

NAVAL ORDER FOUNDATION MAKES MAJOR CONTRIBUTION

Three Companions met recently in Washington, DC to discuss a major advance for World War II Naval Service history. In the office of RADM Jay DeLoach USN (Ret), a National Capitol companion and Director of Naval History and Heritage Command (NHHC), CAPT Charles C. Chadbourn III, also of the National Capitol Commandery, and CDR Doug Smith of the Newport Commandery, discussed how Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz's war diary will be preserved before the original materials become too deteriorated. The "Grey Book," a daily narrative including messages, letters and directives, represents Nimitz's Running Estimate of the Situation for the Pacific War.

The Naval War College Foundation has spearheaded a campaign to digitize these materials, raising the first \$5,000 needed. With the authorization of CAPT Ken Johnson, NOUS Commander General, the Naval Order Foundation made an identical contribution and presented the check on behalf of every NOUS Commandery at a recent event in Newport. With much of the funding secure, RADM DeLoach has been able to order this wartime correspondence be digitized and made available for public scrutiny.

The Naval Historical Foundation has now confirmed with NHHC archives that there are eighteen archival boxes of the manuscripts to be scanned, nine of bound typescripts and nine of loose leaf typescripts. Two boxes are already checked out with the work started. Plans are also underway for a website dedicated to Admiral Nimitz's "Grey Book."



NOTES FROM SICK BAY

A year ago, I wrote about a Naval Hospital based at the inland Naval Training Center in Farragut, ID. The Navy set up a similar establishment in rural New York State. Named after a hero of the Battle of Santiago in the Spanish-American War, U.S. Naval Hospital, Sampson, NY had a short but honorable existence during World War II.

The flu bug has been in the news quite a bit lately. Here's your influenza virus primer.

HISTORICAL HALF MINUTE U.S. Naval Hospital, Sampson, NY

In May 1942, President Roosevelt approved the site for a Naval Training Center on farm and vineyard land at the southern end of Seneca Lake, largest of New York's Finger Lakes. The Naval Hospital was placed on 455 adjacent acres. Site clearing began immediately, and the hospital's first ward opened in January 1943. Originally, it consisted of nine permanent buildings constructed of stone and at least 25 "temporary" structures that actually constituted the wards, surgical buildings, labs, x-ray spaces and residences for hospital staff. At its peak, the hospital had 141 buildings supporting 1,000 beds. Medical and support staff grew to include 32 medical officers, 214 nurses, and 640 enlisted personnel including 104 Hospital Corps WAVES.

Rehabilitating injured and wounded personnel became a major emphasis at the hospital with the establishment of the Rehabilitation Service in September 1944. In the first 8 months of 1945, nearly 32,000 treatments were given to more than 840 patients.

A small crew's library opened soon after the hospital. By January 1944, the library was actually broadcasting a weekly reading program all over the hospital, and later instituted a music broadcast with recordings from the library's collection.

The hospital medical service cared for infectious diseases among trainees, with

the new antibiotic penicillin used to cure several hundred cases of pneumonia. The surgical service was a busy one: more than 1800 operations were performed in 1943, and as many were done in the first 8 months of 1945. Hernia repair was the most common surgical procedure, with appendicitis being the most common acute surgical condition.

As the war wound down, Training Center activity decreased, and the hospital became a center for the care of tuberculosis patients. When the TB patients were transferred to VA hospitals around the country, NH Sampson closed 1 July 1946. It experienced a brief renaissance during the Korean Conflict, but thereafter fell into disuse and neglect. Today, the only building that remains in the old hospital site is the brig, now Sampson World War II Navy Veterans Memorial Museum.

MODERN HALF MINUTE An Influenza Primer

The big health news this month is the A/H1N1 influenza epidemic.

Viruses are essentially packets of genetic material. They do not live independently, nor are they capable of reproducing on their own. To make more viruses, they must invade living cells, take over the genetic operations of the cells and order the production of more viruses. In as little as ten hours, hundreds of thousands of viruses are produced and then released from the hijacked cell to invade other cells.

Broadly, there are three ("A", "B" and "C") influenza viruses. "A" viruses are the ones that cause epidemics. The "H" and "N" designations describe two critical viral surface proteins, hemagglutinin and neuraminidase, both important in how the virus invades a cell and then successfully releases the new viruses from the hijacked cell. Sixteen "H" subtypes and nine "N" subtypes have been identified. Only three "A" (human influenza) subtypes have been identified: H1N1, H1N2 and H3N2. Variations of these viruses are responsible for most known human flu epidemics.

Virus genetic material can be made of DNA (the same stuff our genes are made of) or of RNA, another form of genetic material that is somewhat unstable and susceptible to spontaneous change. Flu viruses are RNA viruses, and, like AIDS virus, rapidly and regularly undergo mutations. This tendency to change makes it difficult to create vaccines against them.

You "catch" the virus by inhaling microdroplets of virus-bearing moisture produced by coughing and sneezing flu victims, or by touching something with the flu virus on it, then touching your own mouth or nose.

The best means of protecting yourself and others from an epidemic are: #1, stay home if you have the flu, #2, wash your hands frequently or use alcohol-based (containing at least 60% alcohol) hand cleansers, and #3, prevent aerosol distribution of the virus by coughing or sneezing into the crook of your elbow.

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MONUMENT SHOWS FRENCH-AMERICAN FRIENDSHIP; NAVY HEROES DVD DOCUMENTS IT

At a French Embassy ceremony last March honoring American recipients of the Legion of Honor, Companions Dick Zimermann and Dan Felger made a special presentation on behalf of the Naval Order to French Minister of Defense, M. Hervé Morin.
